W3 venue



North Acton Pavilion serves as our office base, W3 studio, garden, and a vibrant community venue where we host arts, gardening, and creative activities in collaboration with partners and participants. It also provides a space for residents to hold parties, gatherings, and events. The W3 venue is used by various community groups for activities such as the W3 Café, exercise and martial arts classes, programmes for elders, children, and families, as well as arts and cultural projects. All users are required to align with the ARTi ethos, which celebrates art, culture, and community. ARTification also runs many of its own projects here.

activities, including: Shorinji Kempo UK, StayActive4Life, Kung fu, Holiday sheme, W3 gardening & Children's Art drop-in, Ramadan evening gatherings, elders' wellbeing programme, school & college drop ins, and more.



The new W3 Studio: We are thankful to our volunteers who transformed the community hall into a creative W3 Studio which launched with an art exhibition by Gianni Bonincontro. We opened with art, music & more on the afternoon of Saturday 29th April.

The W3 Studio also hosted a powerful exhibition by Asmahan Alkarjosli, titled "The Magic of the East in the Fashion of the West," which paid tribute to the children of Gaza lost in the recent conflict. Her designs merged Palestinian and Western fashion, expressed solidarity, empathy, and unity. The exhibition featured accompanying performances, including by Dr. Amar Alaw's Sufi-jazz saxophone, Saife Alnaffakh's passionate oud compositions, and poetry from Amir Darwish and Hafiza Ibrahim, addressing themes of Palestinian identity and struggle.







Summer 2023 was a busy period, highlighted by the Holiday Scheme, the Dominican Overseas Nationals Association's 45th anniversary celebration, and the launch of new user groups and events. We were honoured to welcome the Dominican High Commissioner, Councillor Grace Quansah, and DONA organisers to the festivities. We were also excited to showcase the various groups and activities running at the W3 Studio. Looking ahead, we invited all to celebrate 20 years of ARTification at the W3 Venue, where we reflected on how we continue to creatively connect people.

Street Canvas

- Placemaking, Creative Enterprise Zone in Old Oak & Park Royal: The ARTi Creative Enterprise Zone project worked with residents and artists to promote the local area and create two public art installations. Community engagement included pop-up events, inclusive participatory discussions, training sessions, celebratory events, and exhibitions. Together, we co-developed themes and ideas for public art in the Acton and Park Royal area, contributing to both the artwork and its message. Engagement was meaningful, achieved through voting, consultations, and discussions. Experts in the creative industries provided training in placemaking, community engagement, participation, development, visibility, and promotion. The project included:
 - I. Artist, Pati Starzykowski, engaged the community in the creation of public art installation. Ecological Sculpture workshops at EX2 studios x 2; Creating nature inspired art for Park Royal
 - II. North Acton Station Square pop up with music, art activities, artisans, stalls & talking to people 13th May,
 - III. Training sessions with Keynote speakers discussing the Creative Industries, Public Art & Placemaking; Community Surveys, Training session by James West (Creative Industry Business Adviser) and Marcus Willcocks (Community Led Designer and Practice Based Researcher),
- IV. Training 'People & Place' Lively Discussion on 29 July led by Evgenia Kritikou in the W3 garden which lent itself to some fascinating discussion, connection and expression. Evgenia

introduced the concept of walking art, the binary opposition of the terms place & space and how connections between them can affect our sense of belonging.

V. Public art developed from community themes by Errol Donald of Mindspray.



- **pART of it**. The Creative Schools University pilot project brought artists and creative professionals into schools to work with children to explore individual and group creative expression. Participants immersed themselves in a variety of 2-D and 3-D visual arts experiences, drawing inspiration from nature. Personal and collective pieces were generated through the workshops, created in collaboration with artists from Northolt Primary Schools and Brentside High School students. Planning took place in the Spring, with artists matched to schools to deliver workshops and make public art during the Summer term.
- Northolt Public Art Project ARTification was selected to deliver the Northolt Public Art programme. The creative brief for the multiple public art sites aimed to capture the rich tapestry of Northolt's heritage, people, identity, and green spaces, ensuring that each public art piece resonated with the community it serves. We gathered an impressive & experienced Stakeholder Panel and issued a Public Artist Call. We received some impressive mural artists interested in the project, and the Stakeholder group met to make decisions on which to proceed with in what location. We then entered the phase of matching artists and sites to express Northolt's heritage, people, identity, and green spaces.

KEY THEMES



• <u>Pavilion Public Art:</u> ATM created a new mural at the W3 Venue, North Acton Pavilion. Inspired by the local ecology and conversations with residents, ATM's design enhances the park setting and beautifully connects the park and pavilion. This artwork decorates the W3 studio wall, courtesy of the local Acton artist.

ATM said of the piece: "Goldfinches were chosen as a subject by local residents because they are such a popular bird in the area. Local people stopped a smuggling ring for goldfinches, which were being illegally trapped in the park and playing fields for sale. That was a big success and shows what a good effect residents can have when they are aware and intervene." Residents feedback has been wonderful.

Projects

Funded projects include:

1. <u>Urban Oasis</u>, We are grateful for the support from City Bridge Trust and Ealing Planning Gain funds. Our garden initiatives extend beyond simply growing herbs, salad, and vegetables; we are actively harvesting, sharing, and tasting teas, creating garden-inspired crafts, and exploring the healing properties of plants, along with the essential role of pollinators. Regular gardening activities continue alongside eco-arts and food-related events, which include sessions with college students. The W3 garden thrives, featuring a bountiful variety of herbs, fruits, salads, and vegetables.

W3 Gardener Ross said: "Today we planted 5 beech trees to fill gaps along the perimeter of the park. This winter we have ambitions to plant up the orchard surrounding the kitchen garden and will be needing help in doing so. A good orchard could really help feed the community and what more do we want than that...."













Garden team member: "I popped over today and could not recognise the garden. It is lush and verdant. Well done everyone. Such a lovely space to be outdoors and take in the big sky."



2. <u>School 'pART of it' project</u> – where we collaborated with 3 street artists, 4 primary schools, 1 high school and numerous students who benefited from the emersion in the public art experience. Experimental workshops, agreeing inspirational themes, scaling up to create murals, and learning from professional artists has been an incredible opportunity.









Brentside High art students helped in the creation of the 4 new pieces of public art, learnt from professional artists, helped primary school children explore mural arts and learnt from visits to Artist studios talking to professional creatives who shared their journey in the arts.

3. Martinwear Centenary project celebrated the Martin Brothers' contribution to art pottery, and who worked in Southall between 1877 and 1930. Produced by Ealing Council in partnership with Artification, Roaming Projects and Yonescat, we were a delivery partner in the Arts Council funded, multi-partnered, community-based programme that explored the contemporary legacy

of ceramic practice. Using Ealing Council's Martinware collection as its starting point, the centennial celebration provided new ways for audiences to engage in artistic activity & the collection. The project extended beyond Southall Library to a Virtual Reality experience, walks, talks and tours including our first Ceramics exhibition at the W3 gallery with associated workshops and events.



4. **Y-Our Story:** This local heritage project will train local people in the skills and abilities to research, capture and tell stories of the areas history from the past to the present. Supported by Peabody, Y-Our Story is one of 6 new projects taking place in Friary Park as the neighbourhood goes through a major transformation.



Revealing Friary Park's hidden history through an engaging community-based project that will highlight the sites and sounds of local heritage interest. This project focuses on the residents' memories, local history, historical events, the local community, and more. We are taking old stories and bringing them to life. This Heritage / Local History project is intergenerational, inclusive and is comprised of training in local history, research, photography, film, oral history, capturing stories, exhibition, and storytelling. Film-making training with young people & capturing resident stories ihas taken place, with heritage, visual arts and drop in events continuing.



- 5. Sanctuary (Haven. Home. Roots/Rooted. H-EARTH) Sanctuary is an 18-month project focused on communities affected by HS2 construction in North Acton and Old Oak, regions rich in industrial history and diverse populations. To ensure community involvement, we began with pop-up events for residents impacted by HS2. Ideas generated from these workshops and discussions informed customised creative and eco-friendly activities. Our goal is to co-create a placemaking program that enhance the area and foster resident cohesion. Sanctuary aims to help residents transform their neighborhoods into sanctuaries during this period of change. We are developing plans for placemaking initiatives in the Victoria Gardens and Wells House Road areas.
- 6. <u>Urban Oasis:</u> this intergenerational Environment and Food project includes planting, growing local, nurturing nature, local food with ARTification. Thanks to the W3 Garden green team. Funded by City Bridge Trust, we are pleased to be developing our ecological work.

 - □ The **plant and art market** is now in its 4th year coordinated by Margrit Wachnicka bringing community, enterprise, entertainment, environmental, arts, performance, and food to the W3 garden. Stalls include Dr Bike, art, craft, plants, music, food, & most importantly a space for neighbours, family and friends to connect, and support small businesses and community groups. The W3 market is an opportunity for local people to share their creations, arts, crafts, plants, produce, and welcomes small businesses, environmental organisations, cultural & community groups to the beautiful W3 garden in our North Acton Playing Fields location.

Acton Carnival

This was our **20th Acton Carnival** & with ACE funding support... we held the 'Emerald Carnival Celebration' on 8th July. Thanks to all for the passion and love of carnival that has kept the event going over the years. Indeed, in 1889 the procession was photographed in practically the same spot that we start today. The procession through the streets of Acton was one of the best as groups rose to the occasion in celebratory style. The festival in Acton Park has become a real family focused event with people of all ages enjoying the food, arts and entertainment.







Acton Carnival 2023 showcased its power on local & digital platforms:

- -Inclusive Engagement: 17 Mas Bands, 370 procession participants, 200 engaged in Carnival Kids Day, & 60 at our film screening event.
- Nurturing Creativity: 73 Creative Practitioners, including 20 designers, 18 tutors, & 35 artists, who elevated creative excellence.
- Artistry: 60 workshop leaders, plus Art & Cultural Zone Creatives orchestrated 20 dynamic activities.
- Dedication: 120 Procession Stewards & festival Volunteers fuelled the event's execution.
- Reach: 4,500 festival attendees, 5,500 parade spectators, 789 streaming viewers, & 10,000+ online audiences were captivated.
